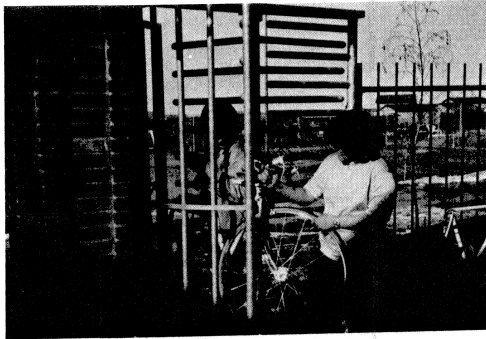


COLORADO COUNTRY
